

Rainbow Colors Set

This collection aims at teaching children to use their hands and draw harmonious shapes with smooth and flowing movements.

The colours are those of the rainbow, symbol of nature and restored harmony. This experience will allow children to compare digital colours with the texture and tactile sensation of finger paints.

TIME

This session lasts 40 to 50 minutes but may vary based on the number of children involved, their age, and the desired level to be achieved.

SPACE

This activity can be done standing up, using a trestle or hanging the sheets of paper on the wall.

There must be enough space to let children move around freely.



ACTIVITY

This activity aims at teaching children to use their hands and fingers and control their movements. Smooth and flowing movements will create harmonious shapes and patterns.

Children will have fun sticking their fingers in paint, mixing colours and creating colourful drawings with their movements.

LEFT AND RIGHT

Pour 6 colours (red, yellow, green, blue, purple, and pink) separately into a plate. Intermediate shades will pop up randomly during the activity.

Ask the children to draw simple, symmetrical shapes, such as an apple or a butterfly. The children will draw these shapes using both their left and right hand with synchronized movements. You can even ask them to do this activity with their eyes closed to make them concentrate on movement and not the drawing.

THE MAGIC OF SYMMETRY

Fold the paper in half and open it back up. This way, the crease will serve as the axis to create symmetrical figures. Choose the shape to draw, for example, a butterfly or a flower. It will be interesting to share and compare the shapes and colours obtained. Children will use their fingers to draw or create patches of colour only on one half of the paper. Before the paint dries, fold the paper along the crease so that the colours mix with a print effect. Symmetrical shapes will start appearing by magic, and the children can complete them using their fingers.

You can even let children unleash their creativity by not giving a theme and letting them choose the colours to use. New abstract forms will appear folding and unfolding the paper.

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
